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English GCSE at Varndean College



You will be taught English Language GCSE (AQA syllabus) in small groups at Varndean College. All students are entered for a universal exam. (There is no Higher or Foundation Tier).

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Aims of GCSE English course

- To enhance your reading and comprehension abilities
- To work on your creative writing skills of narration/description/persuasion
- To improve your overall technical accuracy in spelling, punctuation and grammar
- To cultivate positive, confident learners/communicators
- To help prepare you for A Level courses and/or work which require good literacy and communication

Reading and Writing Skills

Our aim is for you to become more confident and competent writers on this course: to improve your sentence-structure, widen your vocabulary, enhance your accuracy and to read with greater understanding. In order to do so, we would like you to read a wide variety of texts with us and keep an online reading log. This approach is one way we can help you to achieve a Grade 4 or higher, which will make you both more employable and/or help you to do higher level courses in future. Please note that we do occasionally ask students to engage with and explore difficult topics and texts during the course.

As we work through these 5 modules, you will practise:

- Creative and persuasive writing: about places, people and situations both real and fictional, developing short stories, newspaper articles, letters and memoirs.
- Reading: short novels, stories and extracts from both fiction and non-fiction
- Analysing and comparing texts from a variety of authors, in the form of comprehension exercises, short answers and essays
