Reading is central to the course

You will read and analyse a wide variety of texts from different ages and genres and develop your understanding of the ways in which meanings are shaped through close reading. You will examine texts in their relevant social, historical and cultural contexts, investigating the ways in which texts are influenced by and have influence on the contexts in which they are written and received. You will explore different ways they can be interpreted through discussion and the reading of critical discourse. You will be encouraged to read widely and have the opportunity, within the coursework component, to write independently on a contemporary text of your own choice.

To this end our classrooms are inclusive, with much discussion and interactivity. Our choice of texts and the way in which we teach them reflects a commitment to celebrating diversity of voice in the world in which we live. We aim to foster a climate where every student's contributions are valued and in which there is close attention to helping the individual achieve their highest potential.

Creative Writing
