FILM STUDIES STUDENTS IN DEPOT CINEMA SCHEME

The year will end with a student-run film festival at Depot. CHEMISTRY UPDATE

CHEMISTRY CONFERENCE

For the 20th successive year, Varndean College's ChemSoc ran its annual Chemistry Conference at the University of Brighton in February. Supported by the RSC Downland Trust, the conference was attended by all of Varndean's A Level Chemistry students and comprised of a series of talks.

Opened by John Luton, Head of Chemistry for Varndean, a welcome address was then given by Professor Andrew Lloyd, Associate Pro-Vice Chancellor at the University of Brighton; followed by talks from Prof David Read (University of Southampton) about bio-energies and the importance of energy auditing, a very nice example was the huge amount of water needed to produce bioethanol; Dr Rachel Bolton-King (University of Staffordshire) who gave an impassioned talk about the importance of looking through the obvious to the less obvious when dealing with forensic scenes. Prof Peter Atkins (Oxford University) then gave a most profound talk on thermodynamics, looking at how you can consider the dispersal of energy from the sun facilitating the process of thought. The conference finished with 'The Bigger Bang' show by Prof Hal Sosabowski, University of Brighton.



UCL SURGICAL CONFERENCE EXPERIENCE

In January, a group of Chemistry students attended the International Undergraduate & Foundation Surgery Conference at University College London. We started the day with an introduction, then listened to talks from established surgeons about their journeys in the field. We gained insight from guest speakers, with talks ranging from the separation of conjoined twins and the tales of a war surgeon in the Israel-Palestine conflict, then attended individual workshops by undergraduates and medical professionals, including 'Surgical Knot Tying' and 'Women in Surgery'. We then all attended a talk from an undergraduate on how to get into medical school, which equipped us with practical tips for the application process. We also listened to presentations by international researchers. Overall, the conference was informative about the specifics of being a surgeon and we learned a great lot from the specialists who spoke to us. Written by Fiyin Oladipo & Tom Japes

COMPETITIONS

On Wed 6 March, Laura Taramova took part in a competition "Heroines in Science" at Reading University's Department of Chemistry. The event provides students from different schools and colleges with the opportunity to talk about women from any period of the history of science, who have inspired and impressed them the most. Laura represented Varndean College and her heroine was an American biochemist Jennifer Doudna, who co-invented CRISPR-cas9 technology of genome editing. Her presentation was awarded as one of the best, along with the group of students from Langley Grammar



School who kindly volunteered to help her demonstrate the CRISPR method. The Department have also entered a team once again into the Chemistry Analytical Competition at the Queen Mary University, London. The Chemistry Olympiad results are also just in and we have an impressive clutch of ten medals with three Gold! More details to follow soon.



VARNDEAN COLLEGE STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN DUSTY BLUEBELLS PROJECT

Students from Varndean College have been participating in the local Dusty Bluebells Project, a project initially set up in 2018 as a 12 week pilot funded by The Big Lottery Fund, but which has proved so successful it is now run again, with plans to offer it to all care homes and nurseries across Brighton and Hove.

The project was a new initiative by Belltree Music Therapy CIC where traditional stories, music making and songs provide a common ground for the old and young to be together. The interactive sessions enable children and older people to get to know each other as they share ideas, memories and play together. Belltree Music Therapy was set up in 2009 by music therapist, Tina Warnock, who invited Fleur Shorthouse, professional storyteller and Philosophy tutor at Varndean College, to collaborate with her in 2017.

Leading up to Christmas, Fleur brought the project into the classroom by working with the College's Early Years students, demonstrating and teaching the art of traditional storytelling. Students enjoyed drawing story maps and working with stories. As part of their CAS (Creativity, Activity and Service), the International Baccalaureate Diploma students also made their contribution by researching and matching care homes with nurseries in Brighton, Hove and Lewes. Year 2 student, Luca Oppes, matched a staggering 50 care homes and nurseries. The College also has an Erasmus student from Greece who is helping Dusty Bluebells put together a new lottery bid.

Dusty Bluebells has recently been awarded £1500 from Chalk Cliff Trust, which will be used to run workshops and hopes to involve Varndean students with many more projects in the future.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS WIN UK MATHS AWARDS

Three Varndean College international students won prizes in the UKMT Senior Maths Challenge in November. Yanlei Chen achieved a score of 102 (which was the highest score of all Year 1 participants from Varndean), winning her a Gold medal and also a place in the British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1 (BMO1); Jingya Wang, who achieved Silver; and Jiawei Bai who achieved a Bronze medal.

The three students, who are all from China and currently studying A Levels in the UK, are part of the 'A Star Programme' at Varndean College. This is a high-end programme for Chinese students which provides a series of services such as extra-curricular guidance, study tours, group lessons, one-to-one tuition and career planning. It is designed to empower students to raise their potential, helping them to achieve access to the world's top universities.



MATHS FEST 2019

The Varndean Maths Department had a great trip to Maths Fest at the Royal Institution on 2nd February. Maths Fest days are for sixth-form students to celebrate and be inspired by mathematics. Students heard from wonderful mathematicians and online stars about how to melt cars using buildings, how not to estimate the age of the sun, and how to stack pizza boxes and shapes of constant width. They also explored odd numbers in Pascal's triangle and the joy of puzzles. The Royal Institution is an inspiring place and everyone all left feeling full of interest and questions.



OXBRIDGE AT VARNDEAN

Eight Varndean College students have recently been successful in their applications for Cambridge or Oxford Universities. Only about one in five students who apply to these most prestigious universities receive offers. These eight successful students are a mixture of A Level and International Baccalaureate students. Four are current IB students, one a current A Level student, whilst the remaining three are students who left in 2018 but have either taken a gap year or further study before applying.

The three students who left in 2018 and have now received Oxbridge offers are:

Zoe Alexander (ex-Dorothy Stringer) studying History of Art at Oxford; Freddie Guthrie (ex-Oathall Community College) studying Linguistics at Oxford; and Leo Rogers (home educated) studying Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE) at Oxford.

Applying for Oxford or Cambridge involves extra examinations, the submission of written work, as well as individual interviews. Varndean College offers support to students throughout the entire application process and Phil Harland, Principal



of Varndean College said, "students really appreciate the support that our teachers and careers staff provide for them with their university applications; this is particularly important when applying for top universities such as Oxford, Cambridge or any of the Russell Group universities."

As well as individual support provided to students, the College also hosts an annual event every February led by admissions staff from Oxford and Cambridge, where students can learn more about the applications process. In addition to being joined by Dr Matt Bullimore from Churchill College, Cambridge, we were delighted to welcome back Phoebe Menezes-Jones, Varndean College alumna and Admissions



Phoebe, who graduated from St Hilda's with a First in History, shared her experiences of studying at Oxford and gave students valuable advice about applying. Students from Bexhill College and Roedean School joined us at the event.

On 31 January, Varndean College was invited to join Roedean School in a day's visit to a snowy Cambridge University where our Year One students visited Corpus Christi College. They had talks from staff, met current undergraduate students and visited the stunning Parker Library which houses important Anglo-Saxon, medieval and Renaissance manuscripts.

As well as its high-quality A level provision, Varndean College is the only educational provider in Brighton and Hove to offer the demanding and prestigious International Baccalaureate Diploma as part of its curriculum. This internationally-recognised diploma gives students the opportunity to continue six subjects at advanced level, alongside an additional core programme consisting of Theory of Knowledge, Extended Essay and Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS).

VARNDEAN LAW GO NATIONAL!

Varndean Law students have been exceptionally busy since September. Over 40 students are involved in a national lawyerportal scheme. Varndean is the first sixth form college to team up with The Lawyerportal, currently only running in universities, to help students make contacts in the legal world. At the launch party, students signed up and now receive conference tickets, links to law firm recruiters, apprenticeship schemes and industry news. Xander Gowler, the Department's Student Ambassador, is working directly with the charity to make the content relevant for sixth formers.

UPWARDS THROUGH BUSINESS AND LAW

Many of our Business Studies and Law students were presented with one of Varndean College's 'Upwards Through Business & Law' awards in December. These awards are decided by the Business and Law tutors, as well as the Principal, and given out each term to those students on the Business and Law courses to recognise their outstanding work, achievement and effort. This could be engagement in lessons, outstanding progress, attendance or quality of course work. These latest awards were presented by the Principal, Phil Harland, on 17 December.



LEGAL APPRENTICE COMPETITION

Dedicated Varndean Law students have entered a national legal apprentice competition run by international law firm, Kingsley Napley, and The Times. The competition gives students a unique opportunity to find out exactly what it is like to be a solicitor. It also offers a chance to understand the nuances between legal practices such as Criminal, Dispute Resolution, Corporate and Employment law. Teams are able to develop their

teamwork and listening skills, strategic thinking and problem solving, ability to be creative and how to provide sound advice. All teams that submitted their work (24 students) are through to the next heat; which involves an online witness interview and writing a witness statement for court. If teams get through this round, then one more task and it's the live final in London! If successful, there are cash prizes and a potential for a legal apprenticeship.



LAW STUDENTS DEBATE IN THE SUPREME COURT

For the third year in a row (an unprecedented event), Varndean Law students were chosen to take part in one of only 10 debate days a year. The topic this year was 'Do stop and search powers strike a fair balance between the rights of the individual and the interests of society?' A very topical issue with the Terrorism Act allowing stop and search in London without reasonable suspicion. In their teams, students spent weeks preparing their cases and researching key cases to support their arguments.

On the day, they impressed the court and the three barristers working with the teams with their extensive knowledge and the manner in which they conducted their case. Whilst the debate was hotly contested, the argument against stop and search reaching a fair balance won the argument based on the issue of proportionality. Well done to all!

In other news, 50 law students descended on the High Court, the Old Bailey and the Supreme Court to witness criminal and civil cases. They were enthralled with talks from a Court reporter of 30 years who regaled them with tales of murder, treason and barrister's antics. Many are now convinced that law is the right career for them!

VARNDEAN COLLEGE ONCE AGAIN RECEIVES IMPRESSIVE OFSTED INSPECTION

Following their visit in October, Ofsted inspectors have once again confirmed Varndean College as being a 'good' college, where students thrive and achieve. Many aspects of the report received outstanding recognition and praise, with the College's major strengths being identified as follows:


- Governors, leaders and managers develop a highly inclusive culture that allows staff and students to thrive.

Their first stop was a visit to the London offices of the European Parliament where two students delivered presentations on the possible impact of Brexit on the UK, followed by a discussion and debate. They then made their way to The Bank of England where they visited the museum and listened to talks on monetary policy and the importance of the Bank of England.

ART STUDENTS GET INSPIRED BY MADRID

In February, twenty-three Visual Arts students spent five days in Madrid. They went on a Street Art tour, visiting world class museums - Museo Nacional del Prado, Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofia and Thyssen-Bornemisza Museum, as well as visiting an artist's studio. Sketchbooks and cameras filled up with drawings and images of life in the Spanish capital, which the students can develop into final pieces back in lessons.

FOUNDATIONS FOR NEW STEM CENTRE

During February Half Term, contractors took up residence in our north car park ready to start work on our exciting new £2.9m proposed STEM Centre, aimed for completion in Spring 2020.

As students and teaching staff took a well-deserved week's break, our Site Team were busy overseeing the digging of trenches, the erection of fencing and the arrival of diggers and bulldozers. Throughout the past couple of weeks, we have seen the installation of new underground power cables being laid to the college site and the excavation of land to the east of our existing Hutchins Wing.

Over the next 12 months, contractors will be working to construct the impressive two-storey centre comprising of four science labs; six teaching rooms; prep room; toilet, kitchen and staffroom facilities, office/IT space, as well as an attractive lobby and atrium. There will also be an accessible lab, toilet and lift for students with disabilities.

At Varndean College, through our challenging and engaging teaching, we hope to inspire and motivate the next generation of scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. Through this teaching we encourage students to move on to higher level STEM courses and into a STEM career



SPORTING NEWS

Congratulations to three of our first team footballers, Alfie Haggar, Dexter Sherin & Tom Cooklin, who were selected for the Sussex Schools FA U18's rep squad and are now through to the English Schools FA inter county final against Northumberland. Tom Cooklin was also selected for the England Colleges Football Association (ECFA12) mens team and headed out for a tour of Italy during February half term. Tom also plays for Newhaven FC outside of Varndean.

Our first year Sport students recently attended Brighton University for the 'Value of Sport' conference, involving workshops, lab experiences and talks from existing students. Back in November, they also attended a tour of the Amex Stadium, home to the Brighton & Hove Albion FC, as well as attending the Varsity Games at Twickenham.



STUDENT SUCCESSES IN UK MATHS CHALLENGE

Students at Varndean College achieved 4 golds, 10 silvers and 11 bronzes in this year's UKMT Senior Maths Challenge. Over 80,000 pupils from across the UK returned scripts with the top 10% receiving a gold certificate, the next 20% silver and the next 30% bronze.

Approximately 7,000 of the top students are invited to sit one of the follow-on competitions, the British Mathematical Olympiad (BMO1) or the Senior Kangaroo (SKANG). Dylan Ponsford and Eddy Stevens from Varndean College were selected to take part in the SKANG and congratulations to Emilia Frederiksen and Yanlei Chen who qualified to enter the BMO1.



POLITICS TRIP

On 6 February, 26 A Level Politics students spent the day in London putting their classroom learning to the practical test by visiting Parliament and the UK Supreme Court. Walking past protesters for both 'Remain' and 'Leave', they were able to see how these institutions are grappling with the biggest issue of today - BREXIT.

During the tour of the UK's Highest Court, they sat in Number 1 Court where the Article 50 judgement was argued and delivered. Then

after a quick lunch moved on to the Houses of Parliament to begin the second part of the day, a tour of Parliament. During the tour and thanks to the power of Twitter, we were thrilled that both Lloyd Russell-Moyle, MP for Kempton and Peacehaven and Peter Kyle, MP for Hove and Portslade, were able to join us on the tour and take time out of their busy schedules to answer our students' questions.

Later in the afternoon they met up with two of Caroline Lucas

MP's staff to find out more about what it's like to work for an MP, a possible career path for our students, giving an insight into the daily work of both an MP and those who work for them.

A quick dash back to the station and a crowded train journey back to Brighton ended our day with students having a better understanding of just how it all works. From now on, what they learn in the classroom will hopefully make more sense!

VARNDEAN COLLEGE STUDENT GETS TO WORK WITH GREEN MP, CAROLINE LUCAS

Varndean College student Monica Richards has recently attained a parliamentary work experience placement this forthcoming summer, where she will have the opportunity to shadow ex-Green party co-leader and Brighton MP, Caroline Lucas.

Monica, who previously studied at Blatchington Mill School is currently studying the IB, taking Global Politics, World Literature and Spanish at Higher Level, with Biology, Chemistry and Mathematics at Standard Level. She hopes to read Politics, Philosophy and Economics at King's College, London, where she is currently interested in exploring professional avenues such as diplomacy or working within supranational institutions such as the UN.

Her placement was secured after having partaken in a half-day trial in London, and her role will involve her being part of the parliamentary team and undertaking tasks

such as replying to diary invites, research, drafting letters to Ministers, drafting replies to constituents, working on parliamentary questions, database development and administrative tasks such as opening the post and photocopying.



ROME 2019

To help with their studies in Classical Civilisation, students recently enjoyed a fantastic walking trip around the city of Rome. We walked for miles, and around every corner, there was a relevant and interesting site to explore and investigate. On the first day we found our way to the Coliseum where over 2,000 animals were killed a day at the height of its fame. It was mesmerising. The Roman forum where the Vestal virgins kept the hearth burning via the Via Sacra took us to the Palatine Hill, where the top officials lived and could breathe away from the bread and circus living in the centre. The Trevi Fountain and the Spanish Steps were all appreciated, especially as it was really warm and sunny, and on the last evening we found an ice cream parlour which was to die for. On the last day we visited Ostia

Antica, a large archaeological site, close to the modern suburb of Ostia, that was the location of the harbour city of ancient Rome. Students arrived home exhausted and happy. A very good trip indeed.



PSYCHOLOGY ZOO TRIP

A group of 40 Year 1 Psychology students attended a trip to Marwell Zoo in the autumn. They attended a half-day conference designed for A Level students focusing on types of behaviour (both innate and acquired), examples of how and why they are displayed by animals, and how this is applicable to human behaviour. Students learned about classical and operant conditioning and how these are used by the zoo. The students then conducted their own observational comparative behaviour study in the park. It was a very educational and enjoyable trip.



SPANISH TRIP TO SEVILLE

In November 2018 a group of Spanish A level and IB students spent a week in the beautiful city of Seville in Andalucia. They stayed with host families and got a true experience of living in this incredible part of the world. Each day they went to a local language school and had lessons with very experienced teachers and one morning got the opportunity to go to the world famous university. The group had a flamenco lesson followed by an incredible performance by local artists. They also visited the beautiful Seville monuments: the Giralda Tower, the Alcazar (featured in Game of Thrones), Plaza de Espana and the Cathedral. The trip was a great success and an opportunity to expand their language skills and knowledge of the Spanish culture.

SOCIOLOGY CONFERENCE

Early in March, around 80 Year 2 Sociology students (and a small group from Collyers) attended a sociology conference organised by Varndean College. Keith Trobe, an experienced principal examiner, was invited to talk about skills needed for the exam and how to achieve the best result by looking at marginal gains.
