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WE ARE OFFICIALLY A CARBON LITERATE ORGANISATIO

In September 2022, Varndean College was awarded the Bronze status as a Carbon Literate Organisation. This accreditation is the visible 'badge' that shows we are both committed to Carbon Literacy and serious about maintaining our low carbon culture. We are incredibly proud of this achievement.

A Carbon Literate Organisation (CLO) is an organisation that has been accredited by The Carbon Literacy Project as having a substantial commitment to Carbon Literacy. This accreditation supports the development (in addition to the recruitment and retention) of a Carbon Literate workforce and requires an organisation to engage positively with its audience or community in developing and delivering low carbon behaviour.

This follows the successful completion and subsequent implementation of the Carbon Literacy Qualification, a course which has been offered as a pilot scheme across Sussex colleges, with Varndean being one of the first in the country to offer this course.

Achieving the Bronze CLO status is an important milestone for the college especially in light of the impending developments under the Masterplan. The proposals within the plan seeks to improve the current college campus with works that ensure energy efficient buildings with a low carbon footprint in addition to the implementation of the college-wide sustainability projects such as the ecology garden.

CARBON LITERACY STUDENTS TOUCH BASE WITH NATURE

At the end of last term. students who had completed their Carbon Literacy Oualification course were invited to visit Sacred Earth. a beautiful rewilding site in the heart of Sussex for a day of 'Wellbeing in Nature'.

The Wellbeing in Nature project aims to support people's physical and mental wellbeing and gave students the opportunity to reduce depression, gain a more emotional wellness and improve their sleep quality using deep nature connection principles and practices such as mindfulness, bushcraft.

RAMPION OFFSHORE

Students were provided with information on how the wind turbines are designed and constructed discussing the crucial work of geologists, marine biologists, environmental scientists as well as engineers. The talk enabled students to understand more about how wind energy is produced and distributed along the Sussex coastline. This was of particular interest to our Engineering students.

Information was also provided on the variety of career opportunities available in the green energy sector. The offshore wind power industry offers a wide variety of career opportunities other than just engineering; from design, finance, marketing, technology, building, education and communications to name a few.

ANNUAL SAM PATERSON AWARD

In June this year, Varndean College students performed a collection of comedy sketches and songs at our regular "Watch This Space" event at the exciting Electric Arcade performance space in Brighton.

The evening was a celebration of talent and our second years finishing guite an extraordinary two years of study following the pandemic. Performers and audience alike were thrilled to be able to get back into public theatre spaces and celebrate the talent and skills of our wonderful students.

It was also the venue for the presentation of our annual Sam Paterson Award. Now in its ninth year, the award is handed out each year to the student or students 'that have made the most of their studies in drama and performing arts'. Mary Gwynn and Marlon Read were this <u>uear's joint winners. They are</u>

both applying to acting courses this uear and we wish them all the best and look forward to seeing them again soon, as they have agreed to come back and talk about their auditioning experiences to our current students.



UPWARDS THROUGH BUSINESS AWAI

Fifty-nine Business Studies students across both year groups, studying either A Level Business. BTEC Vocational Business or GCSE Business. were accredited with an 'Upward Through Business' award in April. Certificates were awarded to those students who had demonstrated either perseverance, attendance, engagement/attitude, quality of work, research skills, meeting deadlines, online engagement, or contribution to class.

Certificates were presented by Principal, Donna-Marie Janson, with even retired College dog Digby lending a helping hand. Congratulations everyone, keep up the excellent work.

ROYAL SOCIETY OF CHEMISTRY ANALYTICAL COMPETITION

Three teams of Varndean students took part the RSC's Analytical Competition in June which comprised of four practical lab tasks. Team 1 (Anna Zhang, Lola Clarke and Daniela Torres Cuoco, pictured) came first in the local round and were then runners up in the SE Regional Division, being compared very favourably to winners, Oxford International College.

Over three days, their task was to complete four experiments and analyse a group of ingredients to determine the perfect recipe for fish and chips! They had to analyse the amino composition of flour which required careful handling of thin-layer chromatography paper and the spraying of Ninhydrin solution to determine multiple Rf values. They also used the principles of gravimetry to identify the residue left behind after the decomposition of sodium bicarbonate. They then conducted titrations and food tests on starch to further analyse the acidity and composition of the ingredients.

A LEVEL CHEMISTRY Students win Awards in RSC Chemistry Olympiad

A strong team of A Level Chemistry students again took part in the Royal Society of Chemistry's (RSC) Annual Chemistry Olympiad. Designed to challenge and inspire students to excel in the field of chemistry, the competition is one of the leading UK chemistry competitions for students, providing an enriching experience and an opportunity to push themselves further. Students develop critical problem-solving skills, learn to think more creatively and get a chance to test their knowledge in real-world situations.

This year, our students won 6 Gold, 4 Silver and 2 Bronze awards, with the 2 Bronze going to first year students which was an outstanding achievement.

UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE C3L6 Chemistry Challenge

Varndean students also competed in Cambridge University's annual C3L6 Chemistry Challenge. The C3L6 competition is open to Year 12 UK students and takes the form of a 90-minute written exam. Students are awarded certificates of achievement (either a copper, silver or gold award), and those who perform best win an invitation to a residential camp at



Ex-Varndean student, Natasha Wilcock, who studied here from 2013-15, made yet another welcome return visit in May when she gave a very informative and inspiring talk to our current students aspiring to follow a career in medicine.

Natasha, or Tash as she is best known, studied Biology, Chemistry, Maths and French, as well as AS Level in Modern History. She progressed on to study a challenging six-year Medicine degree at University College London (her final year during a global pandemic), graduating in 2021. She is now a qualified junior doctor working at St. George's Hospital, London

the University of Cambridge. This year, 17 Varndean students won an impressive array of awards; 2 gold, 11 silver and 4 copper, with Ella Tingley only 4 marks off of being invited to the University of Cambridge. Congratulations to everyone.

MOCK MULTIPLE MINI Interviews

In November, doctors will again be visiting Varndean to talk to our aspiring medicine students and run two hours of mock multiple mini-interviews (MMI). Interview stations will be set up, giving students the opportunity to experience what it is like to participate in a medicine interview and tackle some of the questions they may face to get into medical school.

JUMPING HIGH For Charity

Back in July, Year Two student Bailey Loncarevic had the once in a lifetime experience of jumping out of a plane, whilst at the same time raising £510 for the charity Mind. Organised by Skydive Buzz in Honiton, Bailey jumped from 15,000ft (the highest in the UK you can jump), the first 60 seconds of which were free fall. Bailey said "It was very exhilarating and I would recommend everyone to do it! Thank you to all the students and teachers who donated money, it was highly appreciated. I chose the charity Mind because I support them with all the work they undertake and due to Covid there has been a huge increase of people with mental health issues. Charities like Mind are needed more than ever now."

Chemistry student Tamsin Quelch came fourth, out of thirteen shortlisted finalists, in the RSC/QMUL I&D 'Chemists Across the Continents' Poster Competition in June with her poster 'Tu You You - The First Chinese Women to Receive Nobel Prize'. Then at the beginning of October, Geography and ES students went on an exciting trip to Iceland, 'The Land of Ice and Fire'! It was a most interesting and well-planned trip. Iceland is geared up for academic groups and the quality of our experience was extremely high. We saw a glacier, lava flow, some dramatic waterfalls, small settlements, the boundary between two tectonic plates, basaltic cliffs and beach, a geothermal power station, several hot mud pools, as well as a geyser. Iceland is a wonderful venue for students and we all came home feeling we had witnessed some

Aurora Borealis (Northern Lights). These courses lend themselves to these types of trip and tutors are keen to build more of them into their study programmes.

Year Two students are also currently working on their coursework investigations in which they undertake research into a small-scale human or natural environment. The outcomes will make a real contribution to our understanding of local issues as well as developing the students research and analysis skills. The coursework counts for 20% of the A level grade. The ES programme is based on 100% coursework so again these students research a variety of important topics and issues such as climate change and biodiversitu loss.



GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS VISIT LONDON'S OLYMPIC PARK

Year Two A Level Geography students visited the Olympic Park on Friday 30 September to investigate the socio-economic impacts of regeneration in London, as part of their Geography A Level 'Regenerating Places' unit. A secondary aim of the trip was to gain ideas and skills for individual investigations. The group were guided around the site still being regenerated after the 2012 games by two excellent tour guides. A highlight was seeing inside the Velodrome cycling arena as well as the large Stratford shopping centre. The site should provide some excellent case studies for their A Level exam.



From 20-25 November, Year Two Spanish A level and IB students will be visiting the fabulous city of Cordoba, in Andalucia, Spain. This is the resume after the pandemic of our amazing Modern Foreign Language trips to Spain, France and Germany. Students will be attending Spanish lessons in the language school, Academica Hispánica/Británica, and living with host families while immersing themselves in the Spanish culture.

ASPIRING OXBRIDGE STUDENTS VISIT OXFORD

In September, a group of our aspiring Oxbridge students, together with two members of staff, spent two days in Oxford staying at St John's College where we were treated to free food and accommodation. Students attended subject specific O&A with tutors, had a tour of the different colleges, whilst at the same time got a feel for the citu when exploring Oxford in the evening.

Year One student, Amelia, said: "I thought this was a wonderful opportunity to see the place we've all been talking about for years. Getting a feel of the city was one of the most important aspects to see whether you'd be happy living there. Everything was so lovely and staying on campus, despite it being quiet, showed what it might be like to live there; the facilities and the opportunities to interact with other students. Experiencing meals was also helpful since there is less emphasis on self-catering there.

Talking to students was particularly helpful; they were incredible in helping to narrow down what college you might like to apply to. The honesty from the students was amazing because you could ask them anything and generally have a chat with them. Interacting with the tutors also made the application process seem more manageable - theu're real people too and want to see students do well."



Varndean College could not have been prouder of its students this year and celebrated the considerable achievements of its students who yet again achieved an outstanding record of A Level, IB and Vocational course results.

Students completing their studies this year had an educational journey like no other, besieged with severe disruptions to their studies through ongoing Covid 19 challenges. For the majority of students, it was their first public examination as their GCSEs were replaced by Centre Assessed Grades following the very first lockdown in March 2020. Throughout their studies students were unsure of just how their final grade would be calculated, as there was a 'Plan B- Covid Contingency Plan' in place until April '22 in case examinations were cancelled.

Despite this, students were truly exceptional and rose to

the challenges, demonstrating remarkable resilience, positivity and strength of character. We are immensely proud of how they responded. Our teachers worked tirelessly with them to ensure that they were prepared for their examinations and that their results reflected this.

The overall pass rate at A level was 97%, with 57% of students achieving A*-B grades and 75% of students A*-C grades.

Students were similarly successful in our vocational courses with a 98% pass rate overall, with 56% of students gaining the very highest grades of Distinction*and Distinction.

- + 100% pass in A level Maths with 35% of students receiving an A or A^{\ast}
- 100% 3D Design students got a high grade with 74% receiving an A* or A
- 75% of A level English students received an A* B grade
- 100 pass rate in all Arts A Levels with high grades of 94% in Photography, 90% in Fine Art,
- 70% of students completing the EPQ gained an A* B grade with 47% gaining an A* or A.
- 60% of BTEC Environmental Sustainability students gained the highest grade of a D*
- 56% of BTEC Sport students studying Level 3 Sport Science gained the highest grade of a D*
- 60% of Level 3 double Health & Social Care gained a Distinction or above.

This A Level success follows on from Varndean's successful International Baccalaureate results in July. An impressive 95% of students passed the Diploma, with students achieving an average point score of 36.24 out of 45 (equivalent of 3 A grades at A Level) and 61% of subject scores were at the top points 6 or 7.

63% of the cohort achieved 36 points or more; an incredible 32% scored 40 or more (the equivalent of 3 A* grades at A Level) with 4 students achieving 44 out of 45, the equivalent to five A* at A Level! 93% of our IB UCAS applicants received offers for Russell Group universities with two-thirds of the Oxbridge applicants securing their places.

Congratulations and well done to all our departing students and the very best of luck for your future.



Olly also ran a work experience hub for the College in June 2022, aimed at students interested in a career in the tech sector. He showed us how software companies work together as part of a team using the popular 'Agile' methodology. Students took on different project roles and developed a project by completing tickets.
