OXFORD UNION SCHOOLS DEBATING COMPETITION

Four Year 1 students competed in the prestigious Oxford Union Schools Debating Competition, the largest debating competition in the UK aimed at students aged 14-18 years.

Lily Tanswell, Erik Hendry, Alice Symonds and Annabelle Holland travelled to Ibstock School in Roehampton where Varndean College was one of only two state funded institutions taking part and our students competed against other teams from independent schools.

The competition uses the British Parliamentary style of debating in which students compete in pairs against three other pairs. There were two debates: 'The rise of short-form content has done more harm than good' (eg Tik Tok, Instagram and Facebook reels) and 'This house supports ecoterrorism'. The competitors had only 15 minutes to prepare and were not allowed the use of any electronic devices during this time. The Varndean teams gave excellent speeches and fielded points of information from other debaters with confidence. Sadlu, we didn't make it to the final, but the whole experience showed just how much talent there is at Varndean.

COMPUTER SCIENCE STUDENTS GET TOP MARKS IN NATIONAL PROGRAMMING COMPETITION

On Wednesday 16 November, eight Varndean College students took part in the 16-18 years category of the UK Bebras Computing Challenge, a national programming competition attracting 11,730 entries nationwide. Five of

the students achieved a Distinction grade putting their marks in the top 25%. Two Year One students, Tommy Crees and Harry Dutta, achieved within the top 10% of grades nationally and will be entered for the next round, the Oxford University Computing Challenge (OUCC) due to take place in January.

Varindean College students studying Sport or Sport & Exercise Science have been very busy honing their skills as sports leaders, coaching primary school students in Brighton and Hove as part of their unit in sports coaching. Visiting Balfour and Carden Primary Schools, students utilised their learnt skills to motivate, organise and lead pupils in a series of activities as part of their practicals.

Our Sports leadership students have also undertaken an amazing job, volunteering and officiating at the Year 8 Brighton School Games Indoor Athletic event. The Brighton Half Marathon saw our students from the Sports Department also volunteer their time to support and provide assistance to the more than 8000 competitors.

Meanwhile in football, following a 5-0 win over Reigate College in January, our superb RMA 1st team secured a spot in the last 16 of the English Schools FA national football cup. Despite not securing the final win in the National Cup, we are proud of their hard work and dedication to their gruelling training schedule. RMA Varndean 1st X1 2-1 against Haywards Heath College with Oliver Parker-Williams and Jack Duckett scoring the winning goals.

On the rugby front, we participated alongside several other colleges across Sussex during a line-up of tournaments creating a strong empowered team who worked consistently hard and showed up motivated and resilient, said their tutors.

Our Basketball team kicked off the competitive season with a series of games that showed the true spirit of camaraderie as they worked together as a seamless unit in a series of competitive matches.

The Sports Department offers enrichment activities in Football, Rugby, Basketball and Netball and all teams are actively engaged in matches, fully supported by staff and the Varndean Community.





Classical Civilisation students enjoyed a wonderful trip to Greece in February. We arrived late at night in the small seaside town of Tolo to hear the waves sweeping the shores outside our hotel and enjoyed our first Greek meal.

The next day we visited Epidauras and saw the Ancient Greek theatre built in 340 BCE, holding 14,000 spectators and where some of the plays we study were first enacted. Students had the opportunity to make some impromptu speeches and practise their acting.

Next was a trip to Mycenae, a prehistoric Greek site in Peloponnese, celebrated by the poet Homer as 'broad-streeted' and 'golden'.

At Olympia we held our biannual Olympics 400 metre race, this year won by Jacob. We then tucked into a Greek buffet lunch. Students had free time in Nafploin town where the sun shone warmly upon us. When we returned to Tolo some brave students even swam in the sea below the hotel!

At the Acropolis we heard about several ancient buildings of great architectural and historical significance, the most famous being the Parthenon. After a busy and very fruitful four days we then made our way to Cape Sounion; the beautiful Temple of Poseidon, enroute to the airport, and bought some souvenirs to remind us all of our trip. Students were brilliant and it will remain in our minds for a very long time to come.

Our Cultural Event held for the first time at Varndean College was celebrated across two days. The event organised by students saw our student community take responsibility for the publicity of the event, the organising of helpers and delegating the cooking of food. The first day had our students offer a range of foods from diverse cultures and backgrounds. We celebrated our diversity through cuisine and on the second day, students wore traditional gear sharing their cultural dances and music. Money was raised for charity and students felt empowered having organised such a dunamic event. Countries represented ranged from Sierra Leone to Morocco, from Turkey to Iran, to name only a few.

The house is designed along the lines of other 'Earthships' around the world to demonstrate sustainable living. Students were given a tour of its features, including solar panels for energy, a solar thermal heater for hot water, south facing windows and air vents to keep the building cool in summer and warm in winter. The building is made of 'eco cement' and old tures to reduce Co2 emissions, Food, water and sewage are also taken care of sustainably. It gave students a great real-life example of what they'd been discussing in class.

Sessile Oak, and will contribute to the college's biodiversity. We look forward to watching them grow and flourish over the coming years.

OUR ONGOING COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

As part of Varndean College's commitment to climate education and our pledge to promote the embedding of carbon literacy into our curriculum, staff and students of A Level Textiles, Photography and Graphics recently undertook a collaborative and creative project, enabling multiple pieces of content to come together in one final outcome.

The theme of the project was sustainable clothing which involved A Level Textiles students making aprons and face masks using only sustainable materials, which were then photographed and edited by our A level Photography students. The Graphics students used their skills to design posters displays; the content of which was to raise awareness of current issues relating to being sustainable in all that we do. The successful collaborative project between these three subjects was then one of a number of Teaching and Learning Projects showcased at our annual Teaching & Learning Fair in January.

Programme Leader for Textiles, Helen Brewer, said "It has been such a valuable experience to collaborate on this project. Not only have we been able to embed the important issues surrounding sustainability into our visual arts schemes of work, but the students have responded so positively and creatively to exploring this theme. We are looking forward to continuing the development of sustainable methods of working in our classrooms and the wider college."

Varndean College continues to promote education for sustainable development and this project demonstrates how students and staff from different disciplines can come together to engage with the issues of climate change. It also provides a forum in which students can empower themselves either individually or as a collective to take action on one of the most pressing issues of the 21st Century.



UK MATHS CHALLENGE

Thirty-nine Varndean students were entered into the UK Senior Mathematical Challenge back in October, with 4 attaining the top Gold award, 11 attaining Silver and 12 attaining Bronze.

The Senior Mathematical Challenge is a 90-minute multiplechoice paper, encouraging mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using mathematical techniques to solve problems.

The four students with Gold (76+ points), Alba Braham, Carmen Maria Pia Nista, Lucas Oliveri and Anastasia Wright, were then invited to compete in the Andrew Jobbings Senior Kangaroo competition in November.



OXFORD UNIVERSITY AWARD CHEMISTRY STUDENTS HIGHLY COMMENDED IN PRACTICAL ETHICS AND RESPONSIBILITY COMPETITION

Four Year One A Level Chemistry students recently entered the University of Oxford's Uehiro Centre 'Practical Ethics and Responsibility' 2023 video competition. The university receives a large number of entries into the competition from schools and colleges worldwide with the standard of entries always being exceptionally high. Our students' entry was assessed by two academics based in the Uehiro Centre and, although not placed in the top final four this year, was awarded Highly Commended and

placed on the reserve list for the final. Their video is to be featured as a Highly Commended entry on the university's competition webpage. Huge congratulations to Wala Mussa, Jasmin Doherty, Tessa Greaves and Mia Macrae.



MICHELLE WINS STEM Smart Silver Award

Year Two International
Baccalaureate student,
Michelle Lin (formerly of Oathall
Community College) has been
awarded a STEM Smart Silver
Award by the University of
Cambridge.

STEM Smart is an online widening participation programme, launched by the University of Cambridge in September 2021. It offers enhanced learning and encouragement to UK state school students studying A Level Maths and Science (or equivalent) who have experienced educational disadvantage or less likely to apply to university. The programme provides extra resources including weekly online subject supervisions with Cambridge academics, regular meetings with a student mentor to discuss life at university, as well as even a Cambridge residential stay.

Michelle's assignments were



focused on Physics, Chemistry and Maths and said "I found it very useful when undertaking my revision and learning new topics ahead of the IB syllabus. When I came across these in class, I was already familiar with the topics. During the summer last year, there was a week-long residential hosted by STEM SMART at the University of Cambridge where there were group revision sessions which I found to be extremely helpful and I was able to learn about life at university."

2023 RSC OLYMPIAD Winners

Eight A Level and IB Chemistry students entered the 2023 Royal Society of Chemistry Olympiad in January and this year won four Gold, two Silver and two Bronze medal awards

The Chemistry Olympiad is open to schools and colleges throughout the UK, aimed at those students in their last year of study before higher education. The competition is designed to challenge students, develop their thinking and problem-solving skills, and test their knowledge of chemistry in real-world situations.

3D DESIGN STUDENTS LAUNCH THEIR PERSONAL INVESTIGATION UNIT AT KEW GARDENS

First year students studying A Level 3D Design launched their Personal Investigation unit with a trip to Kew Gardens earlier in March. Students completed a site visit and recorded the incredible architectural structures and plant forms there. They explored the site and will now use the drawings and photographs as a starting point to investigate one of the themes of Skeletal Structures.

Growth and Decay, Biomimicry or Protection.

Students will go onto producing an architectural structure to be based at Kew (a bridge, treehouse, seed bank, glass house, café, pavilion, aerial walkway etc) or a product such as a piece of lighting, a full-size piece of furniture, site specific sculpture, cutlery/implements, vessels, body adornment, jewellery, automata etc. We look forward to seeing their final outcomes.







AMERICA. HERE WE COME!

February was a busy month for 39 Politics, History, Law, Sociology and Economics students as they and their teachers spent five days in Washington DC and New York, exploring the sights and learning more about their subject areas.

After delays at Heathrow and getting through US customs, we arrived in Washington DC as the sun set, our first opportunity to see the monuments and buildings floodlit.

The next day started with a tour of Congress at the US Capitol Building, before embarking upon a walking tour visiting the Washington, Lincoln, FDR, Martin Luther King, Korean and World War II memorials. After lunch, it was time to visit the African American Museum of History and Culture. Starting three floors underground to experience the effects of the slave trade, we gradually made our way upwards towards the election of Barack Obama and beyond.

Friday brought a long coach drive to New York City, with a much appreciated stop off at a local Walmart store! Arriving in NYC late afternoon, we walked to Times Square, then to the Rockefeller Centre to go to the 'Top of the Rock'. The 360° views at sunset were just stunning.

Our first full day in New York saw us breakfast at Applebees, then take the Metro to Battery Park via Wall Street and the Charging Bull. We got the ferry to Liberty Island and spent time exploring, before moving onto Ellis Island to learn about the experience of immigrants. Back on Manhattan Island we visited the 9/11 Memorial before students then had free time. Many chose to walk with us to Greenwich village, passing the 'Friends' apartment block and the iconic Stonewall Inn.

Sunday, we made our way to Harlem. Here the history and politics of the civil rights movement along with the gentrification of this unique urban area were explored. Students then went off in groups to the Museum of Modern Art, the Guggenheim or explore Central Park. Some students decided to watch the Super Bowl in Times Square.

Our final morning saw us make our way to the United Nations for a look at politics, human rights and development on a global scale. Last minute shopping, then

back to pick up our luggage and off to JFK airport for our overnight flight home.

Head of Business and Social Science, Avril Mackenzie-Parr, reflected, "After all the delays from the pandemic, it was so good to get this trip back in the diary. It was an amazing opportunity for students to explore the history, politics and culture of the US. We packed a lot into a short time but students and staff had a great time"

Later this year, Politics students will have the opportunity to visit the UK Parliament and Supreme Court, as well as see the West End musical Hamilton in preparation for their studies next academic year. We hope to go back to the US soon, but are also planning trips nearer to home to Edinburgh and Berlin.



Back in November, Varndean College hosted an entire day dedicated to Drug Awareness for Year 1 students. Students were allocated slots to listen to an hour-long presentation by DRED UK which has supported schools since 2003 in their personal, social, and health education, tailoring talks to specific needs across all key stages. The talk discussed the direct and indirect impact of drugs and how they are referenced across the media. The host used South Park, a popular American television show, to engage students while educating them on the law, as well as the short and long-term consequences of substance misuse.

COLLEGE PLAYS HOST TO CRIMESTOPPERS & SUSSEX POLICE

Earlier in March, the College played host to the Crimestoppers County Lines mobile awareness van, geared towards creating awareness amongst our community youth.

It was a huge pleasure to welcome Professor Robert Winston to officially open Varndean College's £2.9m STEM Centre on 23 November. Delayed two years by the Covid pandemic, the centre was created to inspire the next generation of scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians and puts Varndean at the forefront of offering the finest opportunity to

those students wishing to pursue a career in these fields.

Attended by the Mayor of Brighton & Hove, Councillor Lizzie Deane, along with a host of local dignitaries, as well as students from eight local secondary schools, the event included a dynamic and exciting Chemistry Magic Show by Chemistry tutor, John Luton; a range of STEM Masterclasses within the new centre; a 45 min inspirational talk given by Professor Winston, followed by the official opening and unveiling of the plague.

Professor Winston is Professor of Science and Society at the Imperial College London, Emeritus Professor of Fertility Studies, Chair of the Genesis Research Trust and on the board of trustees of the UK Stem Cell Foundation. He truly is an inspiration to all and his prolific



work in the field of science has been recognised by his numerous awards over the decades. He has produced over 300 scientific publications about human reproduction and is well-known from his ground-breaking TV documentaries 'Child of our Time', 'Your Life in their Hands', 'A Child Against All Odds', 'Walking with Cavemen' and the BAFTA award winning 'The Human Body'.

- **S Stillness** to create stillness around you through breath, inhaling and exhaling
- **E Exhale** all the pent-up frustration and start over

EMPLOYER SPOTLIGHT SERIES

Varndean College has welcomed a diverse range of speakers from varied career pathways to engage with our students.

In December we hosted our regular Employer Spotlight events, with students having the privilege to listen and learn from Bank of England senior economist, Federico Di Pace, who spoke on inflation, amongst other topical issues.

Applied Psychology students had consultant clinical psychologist, Dr Jamie who specialises in offender personality disorder, give a talk to on the causes thereof and how to apply a theoretical model to case studies.

A further Spotlight Event was also held in Februaru for Year 1 Business and BTEC students A three-hour workshop focussed on aspects of marketing and team work which incorporated the necessary skills to assist students to develop their future careers. Students were also exposed to how current world events impact business daily by University of Surrey guest speakers. Since 2008, the site has been grazed for one week during every winter with sheep owned by the Sussex Wildlife Trust

The Mayor of Brighton & Hove Councillor Lizzie Deane, Varndean College Principal Donna-Marie Janson, as well as representatives from local wildlife organisations, were present to celebrate this momentous occasion. Dorothy Stringer High School shares the 28-hectare Surrenden Campus with six other educational institutions including Varndean College.

A list of twenty butterfly species has been recorded in the Butterfly Haven between 2006 and 2010 and this represents a dramatic increase in species richness. In 2011, the Butterfly Haven was named after the late botanist. Liz Williams, as a tribute to her work and who had bu 2008 recorded 97 wildflower species and 10 species of grass.
