Why be an artist / designer?









The creative industries generate £115.9bn in gross value added (GVA),

nearly 6% of the British economy, and employ 2.3 million people

The PEC has long made the case for the importance of the creative industries as a knowledge intensive, innovative sector, growing at twice the rate of the overall economy. For example, we have highlighted how many creative businesses are already investing in research and development (R&D) and how emerging technologies like AI may offer commercial and artistic opportunities to the sector.

The jobs of the future will need creative thinkers

According to <u>UUK's recent Jobs of the future report</u>, "analytical thinking and creative thinking are the most important skills needed by employers globally" as AI, automation and digitalisation become more and more important to business.


That might seem like a paradox, especially if you've heard reports that these new technologies are making many creatives redundant. But actually, it makes perfect sense. Because the areas of creative work that this new tech is replacing are primarily the mundane, boring stuff. For instance, we no longer need designers to spend hours painstakingly removing an object from an image in Photoshop because Photoshop can now do all that automatically at the touch of a button.

However, it's truly creative thinking that even the most advanced AI still doesn't come close to; only humans can provide that. So, it's the ever-expanding AI industry and the larger tech world that will require a massive influx of fresh creative minds over the coming years.






Creative Industries Employment 14% Above Pre-Pandemic Level


There were 2.4m filled jobs in the UK creative industries in 2022 – a 14.1 per cent rise since 2019 which is well ahead of the average 0.6 per cent increase across all UK

jobs. The figures were compiled as part of the Economic Estimates published for the industries covered by the UK government's Department for Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS).

Despite the negative impact of COVID and other factors on employment in the music and performing arts, fashion and crafts,

overall job creation in the creative industries was more than 20 times faster than the UK average across the whole three-year period.

The creative industry workforce is highly educated, with graduates making up the majority of employees within most industries.


72% of the creative workforce are highly qualified, i.e. hold a degree/ higher level qualification (Level 4 or higher) or equivalent

Why do an Art Foundation Course?



- 1000+ Degree level art/design courses in UK
- The best degree courses prefer/include a diagnostic/ developmental Foundation year
- 200 Foundation courses in the UK

Taking an art foundation course in the UK doesn't preclude you from taking any degree you want but they are, of course, designed with students looking to pursue a career in the creative industries in mind.

It is also worth noting that some arts degrees are four years in length, with a foundation year built-in.

Some of the most common courses of study that students pursue after completing

a foundation course in art are:

- Architecture
- Animation
- Fashion
- Film
- Fine Art
- Illustration
- Interior Design
- Product Design

Apply online - Applications in before Christmas

Entry Criteria:

- 5 x GCSEs at grade 4 or grade C, including Maths and English
- One A level or equivalent Level 3 qualification in a relevant creative subject
- A portfolio of your work.
- Entry to the course includes a portfolio review with the course leader.



What we are looking for?

- Evidence of good drawing skills and a sound understanding of the formal elements; line, tone, colour, texture, pattern composition
- Ability to handle different media, techniques and processes
- Inventiveness and experimentation
- Ability to generate ideas and develop ideas from concept through to realisation
- Evidence of work that has involved students in design decisions and problem solving e.g. fashion, jewellery, textiles, costume, stage sets, prints, 3D design
- Sketchbooks and notebooks demonstrating a students ability to research, experiment and explore ideas through both visual and written approaches
- An interest in historical and contemporary aspects of art, design and general cultural issues
- Energy, self motivation, commitment and a genuine enthusiasm for the subject



The Interview process:

We have on average over 700 applicants each year

Applicants are invited to attend a 1-1 in person interview.

This will be with one of the Tutors, Curriculum manager or Head of Creative Industries

You will have a 20 minute interview where you will be able to discuss and present your portfolio of work and ask questions.

This will be an opportunity for us to talk to you about your work and interests.

INTERVIEWS

Be prepared to answer questions like...

- Why do you want to do this course?
- What aspects of art and design do you enjoy?
- Why is art important?
- What was the last book you read?
- What inspires you to create?
- What artists are you interested in?
- What was the last exhibition you went to?
- What did you think of the work that won the Turner prize?
- What area do you think you want to specialise in?
- Discuss both your favourite and least successful piece of work.



STEP-BY-STEP

APPLYING TO ART FOUNDATION

- Begin researching courses / sign up for email alerts about open days
- Talk to year 2 students & art/design/photo teachers
- Use resources in the college Careers Library
- Contact Colleges / ask questions
- Visit Open Days and Summer End of Year Exhibitions
- Attend the Art Foundation talk at college (Oct/Nov)
- apply before xmas (though it is usually possible to apply later)
- folio/interviews usually Feb/March (but can be earlier)
- Offered a place / accept your place / get your A Level grades needed
- Summer project leading into the course starting in September.

Some courses will ask you to write an ART PERSONAL STATEMENT

- Why do you want a place?
- What can you say about your current projects?
- What exhibitions have you seen?
- Other interests/subjects that you can talk about
- What makes you an interesting student?

+ and/or be prepared to talk about these things at interview

Photography | UAL Foundation

Diploma in Art & Design | Level 3

A year of photographic study that encourages inventiveness and exploration, enabling you to produce a sophisticated portfolio to progress to university or employment.

This level is for students who have already achieved at least one A-Level at grade C in a related creative subject.

Application process is similar, (though the photography interviews can be earlier than the Art Foundation ones).

Folios are usually photographic, though you might include design / art work if you have it, particularly if it includes photography.



FINANCE



 No university-style tuition fees if under
 19 when the course starts, but costs of materials must be met by you.

All 16+ (full-time) courses are free to UK residents who are under 19 years old on the 31 August of the year of entry.

GAP YEAR?

- Not sure about your future?
- Foundation Courses do <u>not</u> hold deferred places

 if you are applying during a year out keep working on your art / adding to your portfolio!

Progression after Foundation Course

- Apply to Universities through UCAS during Foundation Course
- Late March deadline for most Art Degree applications
- Foundation course tutors guide and advise on 1st
 & 2nd choices etc.
