



WORLD-BEATING SCORES
YET AGAIN FOR VARNDEAN
COLLEGE IB STUDENTS







Varndean College once again celebrated outstanding International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma results back in July, with this year's cohort of students bound for leading universities including Cambridge, Durham, Bristol, UCL, Warwick, York, Sheffield and Leeds.

Star performers included Anya Rehman-Wood (ex Downlands School), whose near-perfect score of 44 points out of 45 - comparable to five A*s at A Level - placed her in the top 1% of 169,000 IB students worldwide. Anya will study Medicine at University College London. Dylan Ponsford (ex Lewes Priory), with 42 points, will read Mathematics at the University of Warwick, while the 41 points achieved by Cardinal Newman's Sophia Stamoulis and ex-Dorothy Stringer duo Freya Clarke and Ella Remande-Guyarde put all three of them in the top 2.5% of students worldwide. Ella will read Politics, Philosophy and Economics at the University of York.

Nearly half of the 50 students achieved 36 or more Diploma points, equivalent to AAA at A level; with nine gaining an impressive 40 points or more, equivalent of A*A*A* and placing them in the top 3% of students worldwide.

Congratulations went to Kate Granlund (ex Dorothy Stringer) who achieved 40 points and is studying English at Cambridge, as well as all our IB students who secured places on Medicine degree courses: Daisy Beddall, Amalia Coburn, Louie Garnett, Ella Shepherd, Anya Rehman-Wood and Jessica Simpson.

These results came at the end of another successful academic year for the IB Diploma at Varndean College, praised recently by Ofsted who commended the "exceptional quality" of IB students' work at the College, adding, "Students on the IB course make outstanding progress. Their achievement is exceptionally high and well above the international average."



Varndean College is the only local state-run provider of the IB Diploma in the local area, which it has offered since 2008. This prestigious Diploma is one of the world's most highlyregarded and academically rigorous educational programmes, requiring students to succeed in six subjects - including English Literature, Mathematics, a Science, a Foreign Language and a Humanities subject - as well as completing a 4000-word extended essay on a subject of their choice and undertaking community work.

Lee Finlay-Gray, IB Diploma Coordinator, commented: "The IB Diploma is a demanding course, which yet again has inspired our students and teachers to excel. Our learners leave us as confident and articulate young people, independent, questioning and knowledgeable about the world around them. They are a credit to the College and the IB community."

Ex-IB student Ella Cohen-Haddon, who graduated this year from Oxford University with a degree in Oriental Studies, said: "My enthusiasm for languages was really cultivated by the wonderful French and German teachers I had during my time on the IB at Varndean and more broadly I think that the IB encouraged me to think beyond the UK and Europe in terms of education and possibilities."

Varndean College is once again delighted with the success of its students who have yet again achieved an impressive record of A

- Level and Vocational exam results. • 1229 A Level exams were taken
- Overall pass rate at A level was 97.5% with almost 50% achieving A*-B and 72% achieving A*-C arades
- 21 vocational courses had a 100% pass rate.
- Visual Arts courses (Art, Graphic Design, 3D Design, Textiles and Photography) were once again extremely impressive. Out of the 254 entries, 94% of students achieved A*- C grades.
- Our English, Film, Humanities and Law continue to be outstanding. A level Law students gained 100% pass rate with 63% getting A*-B, Film Studies 100% pass rate with 64% A*-B, English Literature 100% pass rate with 84% gaining A*-C, Politics students 100% pass rate with 77% gaining A*-C.

Principal, Phil Harland, said; "We are extremely proud of the excellent results achieved by our students again this year, particularly with the A Level linear format being reintroduced recently. This has made the exams even more challenging; and students and staff have worked tirelessly over the last two years in order to deserve the success they have achieved. I would like to thank my entire staff for their hard work and enthusiasm over this past year and for giving our students the drive and passion to achieve the best they can."

This exam success follows on from the successful International Baccalaureate results earlier in July, when 50 IB Diploma students averaged 36 points, the equivalent to 3 A grades at A Level, with nine students gaining an impressive 40 points+ (equivalent to 3 A* grades). CAMBRIDGE CHEMISTRY COMPETITION SUCCESS

Varndean College students once again competed in Cambridge University's annual C3L6 Chemistry Competition and yet again won an impressive array of copper, silver and gold awards. Thirty-six Varndean students were granted awards; 1 gold, 15 silver and 20 copper. This represented just under 50% of first year International Baccalaureate students and 63% of first year A Level students.

The competition is open to any UK student in Year 12 (ie first year of sixth form) studying either A Levels or the International Baccalaureate. It takes the form of a 90 minute written paper which students take within college. Students who do well in the competition are sent certificates of achievement (either a copper, silver or gold award), and those who perform best win an invitation to a residential camp at the University of Cambridge at the end of August.

CHILDCARE AND EDUCATION DIPLOMA STUDENTS YET AGAIN ACHIEVE OUTSTANDING RESULTS

Varndean College's students undertaking the two year NCFE CACHE Level 3 Diploma in Childcare and Education have once again achieved an outstanding set of results; some continuing their studies on higher education degree courses and some receiving offers of employment.

The fourteen students who recently completed course achieved an impressive 100% pass rate, with 50% achieving an A*- A grade and 50% achieving B-C.

Samiya Ali and Serine Toumi will study Childhood and Youth Studies at Greenwich University; with a third, Ali Rabina, also going to Greenwich University to study Criminology & Criminal Justice. Laila Elhadaoui will study Early Childhood Studies at the University of East London and Danielle Moss, Children's Nursing at Edge Hill University, Lancashire. Ella Collins and Kaitlin Holford have offers of employment in childcare and education. Ella as a teaching assistant at Downs View School and Kaitlin looking after children at a children's holiday club in Greece.

This follows on from last year's success when three Childcare Diploma students took up places at Brighton University to follow Teacher Training degrees and two students went to the prestigious Norland College in Bath to become 'Norland Nannies'.

The NCFE CACHE Diploma is a two year vocational course, equivalent to 3 A Levels, in which the students undertake a series of coursework units. They also have to complete 750 hours of work placement, as well as undertaken a 5000-word essay.

All agreed however that the last challenge of pitching to a potential high-profile client was the most difficult - something they all aim to perfect for this year's competition.

FIRST FEET EXPERIENCE!

Last summer, Varndean College medic students visited The Leaf Hospital in Eastbourne, a university hospital specialising in podiatry. They were given the opportunity to experience first-hand what it would be like to study on a podiatry course run by the University of Brighton. Firstly, they tried plaster casting on each other, which helps a podiatrist to observe the foot structure and any defects. They were then consulted on choosing the right footwear and some students were advised on changing their own shoes to avoid future feet problems.

Later, Professor Ivan Birch introduced them to Forensic Podiatry and how this can be applied in identifying criminals. Then, following a short break, the students were provided with an anatomy session supervised by one of the lecturers, in which they investigated leg structure and possible defects caused by factors and diseases. A Year 3 university student then provided small tour around the hospital. The students felt that it was a well-spent day with lots of new information to consider for their future career aspirations.



STEM TO GROW **ATVARNDEAN** DRAMA & PERFORMING Construction of our new £2.9m STEM Centre is now rapidly taking shape and over the past few months we

have seen the main external frame structure completed, with work now currently being undertaken on the interior. Over the next 4/5 months,

contractors will continue working to construct the impressive two-storey centre comprising of four science labs; six teaching rooms; prep room; toilet, kitchen and staffroom facilities, office/IT space, as well as an attractive lobby and atrium. There will also be an accessible lab, toilet and lift for students with disabilities The Centre is due to be completed by the end of February 2020.

At Varndean College, through our challenging and engaging teaching, we hope to inspire and motivate the next generation of scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. Through this teaching we encourage students to move on to higher level STEM courses and into a STEM career.

From September 2020, as well as continuing to offer A Levels in Biology, Chemistry, Maths and Physics, and vocational courses in Applied Biology and Applied Science, the College will be introducing a brand new Level 3 vocational course in Engineering. The course will be the equivalent to one A Level and will include units on: engineering principles; engineering practices; engineering product design and manufacture; and electronic devices and circuits.



WHY IS ADDRESSING CLIMATE CHANGE SO DIFFICULT?

Varndean College has entered the 2019 CORE Schools Economics Challenge (CORE-SEC).

Organised by The CORE Project in collaboration with The Financial Times for Schools, this international competition challenges students from schools and colleges across the world to create a three-minute video, with this year's theme being 'Why is addressing climate change so difficult?'

Varndean Year 2 Geography students, Lily Tregenza and Grace Algar, have been working tirelessly over the past few weeks and their final video was submitted on 30 September. Winners will be announced on 25 October, with first prize being £1,000 for the College and £500 Amazon



GEOGRAPHY AN ENRICHING SUBJECT

We all know Geography is a dynamic subject in which students get out and about and involved in hands-on activities and this year has been no exception.

In the summer, Geography students undertook three days of intensive fieldwork, visiting a range of sites including the East Sussex coast, Seven Sisters Country Park, Portsmouth Waterfront, as well as rural areas of Mid Sussex. They learnt how to collect a variety of field data in both human and natural settings. At Portsmouth, they evaluated the Gunn Wharf development within its local hinterland and in Mid Sussex measured trees to assess the carbon and water storage capacity of a small woodland.

Last autumn, Year 2 Geographers visited London to gauge the impact of globalisation around The Shard, as well as studying geology and natural hazards at the Natural History Museum. This autumn students will visit London for a lecture programme with geography

speakers, such as Professor Danny Dorling (from Oxford) an expert on global inequalities. We shall also visit an area to look at diversity.

Year 2 students are also currently working on their coursework investigations in which they undertake serious research into a small-scale human or natural environment. The outcomes may make a real contribution to our understanding of local issues as well as developing their research and analysis skills. The coursework counts for 20% towards their A level grade.

We have a long tradition of visiting international destinations, both in Europe and further afield. In October, Geographers will join with students from other courses to visit New York

City, Philadelphia and Washington DC. Over the years we have taken many groups to North America and have developed an exciting programme of study experiences, including visiting the United Nations HQ and conducting 'cultural geography' research in Harlem.

Lastly, we are delighted that many geographers have joined the College Environmental Committee. This student led group meet to organise campaigns or take part in practical conservation activities. Over the years they've helped to create our campus nature reserve, as well as promote environmental campaigns around College. This year we are hoping for some really exciting ideas to surface. Watch this space!

COMPUTER SCIENCE STUDENT MAKES BAFTA FINALS

Varndean College Computer Science student Jude Birch (who left the college this June) was one of only 11 UK finalists in the British Academy of Film and Television's (BAFTA) 2019 nationwide competition to find the country's best young game designers.

The annual competition is open to young people aged between 10-18 to submit game designs and concepts which address a wide range of social issues including mental health, climate change, conservation, disability, bereavement, and the rights of transgender people. Jude's submission in the '15-18 years Game Making' category was a futuristic adventure game called 'Space Core' using Unity.

Jude (ex Lewes Priory School), who has recently completed two years at Varndean studying A Level Computer Science, Physics, Maths and Further Maths plans to take a gap year before hopefully studying Computer Science at university in 2020. Jude is no stranger to winning competitions. In 2018 he was the winner of Google's annual Code-In competition, winning a trip to California to visit Google's HQ, and also in 2018 was announced 'Young Innovator of the Year' in The Argus's Youth in Action Awards.



Back in May, Year 1 Level 3 Creative Media Production students spent the day at the Warner Bros Harry Potter Studio Tour in Watford. They had a fantastic day discovering all the behind the scenes magic of the Harry Potter films; practised spell casting, visited platform 9¾, jumped aboard the Hogwarts Express, as well as experiencing the iron belly dragon at Gringott's bank!

Year 1 student Sadie Funnell said "It was quite surreal to go behind the scenes and see the actual sets and props that were used during the filming of Harry Potter. Overall it was a brilliant day and I would recommend it to anyone who is thinking of going."



Year 2 CTEC Level 3 Creative Media students were visited by Chris Hogg, Media Arts Lecturer from Roual Holloway University on Friday 20th Sept. His visit was primarily to talk to students about progression to study Media & Film at university and to give tips about how to write a Personal Statement. They presented their campaign to several local schools and were awarded a certificate by the Mayor of Brighton & Hove, Councillor Alexandra Phillips. NEW INITIATIVE TO **IELP ANY STUDENTS** VITH MENTAL **HEALTH ISSUES**

Nineteen Varndean College students have been trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid. The training was conducted by Brighton & Hove Public Health School's team and involved students developing their skills and confidence to spot the signs of mental health issues in a young person, to offer first aid and guide them towards the support they need. The Mental Health First Aiders work closely with the College's Wellbeing team and are supervised by Psychology Teacher, Helen Chong. Throughout the year, the Mental Health First Aiders offer peer support and run campaigns to raise awareness and reduce the stigma of mental health
